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## Course Description

Choir is a performing ensemble that meets every day for one scholastic credit. Students who are also in band first period split their time between the two ensembles, attending chorus on days 2,4 , and 6 , and receiving $1 / 2$ credit for each performing group.

In chorus, students learn and perform a variety of choral literature. Skills that are developed include music reading/literacy, sight reading, vocal technique, listening skills, ensemble sensitivity, stylistic differences, singing in different languages, performing different styles of music, historical and cultural background of pieces, performance etiquette, working as a member of a team, following choral conducting gestures, and constructive evaluation of performance.

Students will be evaluated and graded in a variety of ways. Short quizzes will be given every few weeks, as well as a final exam. Students will be graded on their performance of choir music at least once every quarter. Students will be expected to do some work outside of class every quarter and can select a way to fulfill this requirement from a variety of options presented on page 4. Please pay close attention to the requirements for the option you chose, as this will affect the grading of that assignment. The homework requirement is intended to give students a deeper understanding of music, singing, and performing and to cover the New York State Standards for the Arts which are not as easily covered in an ensemble setting.

The public performance of our music is a mandatory part of this course, with four required concerts. Attendance at these events contributes 20 points to that quarter's grade. The only excused absences from a concert are sickness or a family emergency, both of which require a note to the director for record-keeping. ## Concert Dress

Students will be provided with a choir robe and stole for all concerts unless noted otherwise (community concerts). At concerts students should wear the following under their robes:

## Grading

Students will be graded every quarter based on the following categories:

| Class Participation | $40 \%$ | $*$ (rehearsal participation each day) |

* Absenteeism - All students are absent at some point or another, and if it is an occasional occurrence it is easy for the student to pick up what he/she missed, but if it becomes a frequent occurrence, the student(s) get quite behind. Since choir is an active interaction between student and teacher (and group), this work cannot be made up on one's own. As a result, for every 4 classes that a student misses in a marking period, they must attend $\mathbf{1}$ - Homeroom or $9^{\text {th }}$ period with Mrs. K-B McLaughlin to make up the missed class credit points and material.


## ** Out-of-class Development

Each student can earn $90 \%$ of their grade for choir during class time and at concerts. The remaining $10 \%$ of the grade is earned by applying what is learned during class by completing one or more of the following approved activities below. Each activity is worth a certain amount of points according to how much it reinforces the student's development of their choral skills. Make sure that the points you complete add up to 10 to ensure that you receive full credit in this category.

Be sure to plan to complete 20 points worth each quarter to maximize your grade. If you miss your voice lesson, be sure to make them up, preferably by the end of the same week, but definitely by the end of the quarter. You may earn up to 5 bonus points in this category.

## Vocal Lessons

Vocal lessons are an opportunity for students to get individualized attention, work on solo and small ensemble music, reinforce and solidify choir, co-curricular choir, and musical music, and prepare NYSSMA solo and ensemble music. Group lessons are rotated through the school day so that each student does not miss the same class more than once in four weeks. Lessons are essential for the vocal and musical growth that each student can achieve. All high-level choirs attribute a major part of their success to the vocal lesson component of their program.

Participating students will report first to their regularly scheduled class (on or ahead-of-time) to let their teacher know that they have a lesson that period. If you cannot miss the class (because of a test, etc...), no problem, speak to Mrs. K-B McLaughlin ahead of time or the next day to schedule a make-up lesson. The student is responsible for any homework, reading, and assignments in the class they are missing!!!!

## Blue Notes and Ruby Rhythms

Blue Notes and Ruby Rhythms were established several years ago as select ensembles designed to give high-level performers experience in different musical genres and as a way of giving back to the community through performances. Over the years, each group has earned a strong reputation of musical excellence and is in demand throughout the community. Auditions are held each September for those interested in joining their ranks. If selected, members are expected to attend regular rehearsals (Rubies on Tuesdays and Blue Notes on Wednesdays, both from 3:00-4:30) and to attend all dress rehearsals and performances (barring sickness or emergency).

## Christmas Ensemble and the March Musical

The Christmas Ensemble performs holiday tunes for the JM Murray Center, Walden Place, the Elementary School and for the public at other possible events/locations. All students currently enrolled in Band or Choir may participate as long as they can attend the required rehearsals.

The March musical is open to all Homer HS students as long as they can attend the required rehearsals. An audition is required so that we can determine how best to place each member of the cast. Cast members are given singing credit.

## NYSSMA Solos \& Honor Choirs

All members of Homer choirs may select to prepare a NYSSMA solo or small ensemble for the solo festival in the spring. The student would prepare the song at home and in vocal lessons, then perform at the festival for a state-certified judge to grade and give comments on his/her performance. This is a wonderful opportunity for personal growth and highly recommended for any student willing to put in the preparation time. If cost is an issue, please see Mrs. K-B McLaughlin for assistance.

If you perform particularly well on an upper-level NYSSMA solo (Levels V, VI, or All-State VI) you may be selected to participate in an Area All-State Choir or All-State, the most prestigious of all ensembles. If accepted, the student would prepare music at home and at a time arranged with Mrs. K-B McLaughlin. All students who perform a vocal NYSSMA solo will be given the option to opt-out of the final exam for choir.

## Private Voice or Piano Lessons

For those students taking private voice or piano lessons, please have your private teacher email me in the last week of each quarter to receive credit.

## Community/Church Choir Participation

Applying the skills one learns in an academic choir by performing and giving back to the community is highly encouraged. If you participate in this sort of ensemble, please fill out the following form each quarter to receive credit.


## Program Notes

Program notes are a short paragraph or two that give background information about a piece of music, the composer who wrote it, and other pertinent information about its performance and history. A student wishing to write program notes must request one of the songs they are performing with Mrs. K-B McLaughlin, receive approval, and then submit the program note at least one week before the concert or the marking period, whichever comes first. Program notes must be at least 200 words in length and must cover at least two of the following topics:

- History of the musical piece
- Biographical information about the composer
- Explanation of the meaning of the lyrics
- Translation of the text (if in a language other than English)
- Musical characteristics of the piece (major melodic themes, form, contrast, style)

All program notes must be the student's original work, with any quotations citing the source. See Mrs. K-B McLaughlin for professional examples of program notes.

## Choral Concert Review

Students are encouraged to see others performing choral music in the community. If you choose this as your assignment turn in a typed and double-spaced paper (minimum of one page), reflecting on three songs from a choral concert, meeting the following criteria:

- In the introductory paragraph, tell us the name of the group, where and when they performed (or released the recording)
- In the three body paragraphs, state the name of each song, the composer or arranger of that song, and critique the performance using the following vocabulary:
- Vocal Technique (blend, balance, tone, diction, etc)
- Dynamics (piano, forte, mezzo piano, whatever applies)
- Descriptors of the mood or feeling of the piece
- In the conclusion paragraph, give your overall impression and/or rating of the performance


## Choral Officers

In the first week of school, the Choirs will elect officers to assist in the maintenance and improvement of the choral program as a whole. The choirs will nominate candidates, and interested nominees will prepare a statement to present to the choir on why he or she would be a strong candidate for that position. After the statements are presented to the choir there will be an election. (The exception being the position of treasurer, which will be appointed by the director.) This elected body will meet once a month (or more, if needed) to manage choral activities. The titles and responsibilities of the offices are:

President - oversees all duties, takes attendance, reports to choir
Vice-President - organizes and oversees committees, takes attendance, assists pres
Secretary - takes and posts meeting minutes, organizes public relations
Treasurer - manages choral account, assists director with fund-raisers
Historian - tracks and documents the activity of the choral program over time

## Music Boosters

The Homer Music Booster Club was organized to encourage and maintain an enthusiastic interest and support for the music program of the Homer Central School District. Its purpose is to lend all possible support to each of the music groups of the district in accordance with district policy. Meetings are listed on the school calendar and are generally the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the high school cafeteria. Parents of all Homer music students are strongly encouraged to get involved for the sake of all our students in this district wide activity. The time commitments to maintain a successful booster program are generally minimal, and the rewards that our students receive for our efforts are tremendous!!!

Boosters need parent volunteers on a variety of levels, from low commitment to more involved leadership positions. Your assistance is vital to the survival of this group! The Boosters need parents and families to:

- Attending meetings and voting on items
- Sell concessions at music, theater, and athletic events throughout the year
- Man tables at Open House
- Help with the discount card sale
- Assist in Cabaret, their main fundraising event by:
